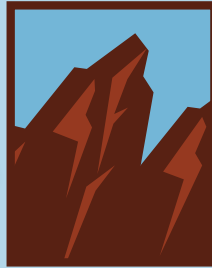

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President's Report

Welcome to a so far uneventful 2017. We're beginning our second year of our board led work evenings in Red Rock Canyon, helping with some small projects that need a bit of attention. Last year over 100 hours of volunteer time was dedicated to projects like corridor clearing, trash pick up and barbed wire removal. This year we hope to increase participation, so please keep an eye on our Facebook page and website for details on where and when we're working next.

Speaking of the board, we have all been quite busy with various projects for the coming year. Shanti as usual has been spearheading the trails projects, David the popular educational programs, Joe working on the Colorado Public Lands Day event, Dave with the rangers on so many of the day to day things that constantly happen, Erica in getting us all official as crew leaders and also our fancy new T shirts, and of course Ted providing more adventure than any of us can handle alone.

This summer we're also working on expanding our communication lines with city parks staff. As many

of you have seen, there's a lot of trailbuilding going on since our last newsletter. These trails are part of the Master Plan laid out for Red Rock Canyon years ago, and we are happy to see work getting completed. We've seen reports of issues in the open space as well, and we highly recommend using the GoCoSprings app at <https://coloradosprings.gov/gocosprings> on your mobile devices to report things like drones, homeless encampments, graffiti, tree vandalism or generally sketchy behavior. The app automatically categorizes the issue and reports its location to the city people that can handle it.

I hope many of you can volunteer during Colorado Public Lands Day. It is shaping up to be a fun event with some morning trailwork, and various afternoon activities for participants. I'd like to take a moment to plug my own contribution here of leading a geology and paleontology hike through the Cretaceous seas of Red Rock Canyon (particularly because that's the direction we need to go to get to Fossil Craft Beer) to finish the day. Hope to

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see you there, and if not, pick up some dog poop on your next hike to help make our open space just a little bit better.

Education in Red Rock Canyon

The educational series of Talk and Walks are being planned again for this summer in Red Rock Canyon. Past years we have offered informative sessions on weekday evenings, usually starting around 5:30 and ending before dark. Presentations are done by volunteers with expertise in their subject area. The presentations are basically informal, letting presenters give information about their subject first, the "Talk", then everyone goes out on a hike led by the presenter, the "Walk".

Talk and Walks last summer

were given in *Leave No Trace, Invasive Weeds and Plants, and a couple on Geology*. Each Talk and Walk is generally announced for sign-ups through our Friends of Red Rock Canyon email list and website, though sometimes the word of these events makes it into local newspapers. New Trails in Red Rock Canyon

Colorado Springs Parks Department is adding roughly 5 miles of new trails in Red Rocks Open Space that are very mountain bike friendly. Built by Singletrack trails, while they are all multi use, they are designed to be fun on bikes. Located mostly in the South East corner of the park, they connect Intemann trail through the dump and on to the pavilion on the east side. There are several different trails that interconnect and create various new routes and possible loops. Names for the new trails are yet to be announced. Intemann trail itself is being rerouted in places to eliminate the worst of the non sustainable sections. Construction is going on now and will be for another month or so.

Please respect any social trail closures and be careful around the trail crews.



Colorado's First Ever Public Lands Day to be Celebrated

In May 2016, Colorado became the first state in the nation to establish a holiday recognizing the value of public lands within the state. From now on, the third Saturday in May will be known as Colorado Public Lands Day celebrating the significant contributions these lands have to our state. The bill passed with bipartisan support and was signed into law by Governor Hickenlooper.

Locally, the inaugural holiday will be recognized with a day of service, recreation, and celebration at Red Rock Canyon Open Space. The plan is for a day of fun with a morning spent working on a trail improvement project within the open space followed by a variety of recreational opportunities to choose from and an after party hosted by Fossil Craft Beer Company! The service project will be finishing work on the newly constructed

White Acres Trail (expected to be completed in the coming weeks), as well as restoration projects designed to protect our treasured Open Space. Recreation activities are expected to include hiking, mountain biking, climbing, and an educational geology walk led by FoRRC.

The following groups are coordinating efforts for the event: City of Colorado Springs Parks, Recreation, & Cultural Services Department, UpaDowna, Medicine Wheel Trail Advocates, Rocky Mountain Field Institute, and Friends of Red Rock Canyon Open Space.

Joining Scenic Colorado Cleaning Highway 24

On Saturday morning, March 18th, a band of volunteers helped to clean up Highway 24, running by Red Rock Canyon. Larry Barrett, with Scenic Colorado, has been working a number of years taking care to beautify the road from about Ridge Road to the Manitou Avenue exit. Much of the work is clean up, that is picking up the trash along the highway. A group of Air Force Academy Cadets joined us today for the segment from Ridge Road to 31st. The Cadets are from the 38th Squadron, also known as the "Almighty All Stars." Along with the Cadets today were a couple of Board members from the Friends of Red Rock Canyon.

The mission of Scenic Colorado is to preserve and enhance the visual environment and aesthetic character of the communities and country sides of Colorado. Clean up days are typically scheduled for Saturday mornings several times a

year depending how much litter there is along the road. Volunteers usually start around 9am and, depending on how many people show up to help, ending between eleven and noon. 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Trails, Trails, Trails

Colorado Springs has been a busy beaver building and improving trails all over Red Rock Canyon Open Space and they are still at it. All trails are multi-use. Some trails are further out, so are used by mountain bikers, while others are closer to the parking lots for walkers.. This year and last year new trails along the east side of the Open Space allow for trail loops of all different lengths. It is great to see so many of us and visitors getting out to enjoy nature. The ponds are full and the reflection of Pikes Peak in the water still makes RRC one of the best places to take an iconic picture of our mountain. If you haven't been out lately to see your RRC, you have a treat in store.

There is a lot new to explore. Here are some of my new favorite trails (many are so new they are not on the maps and do not have names I know).

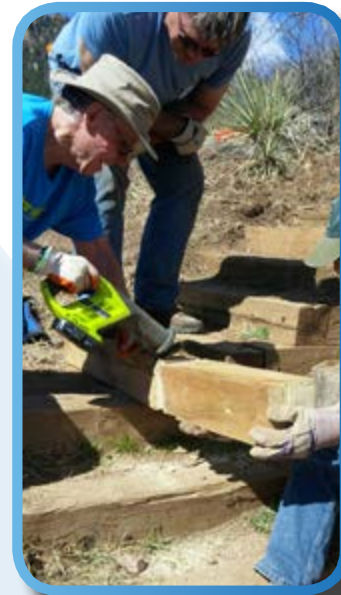


The new trail that goes east from the Bock Pavilion is short, steep and looks like the Manitou Incline because the wooden steps are wired together with cable. I call it the bomb shelter trail because it goes above where the 1960s nuclear bomb shelter used to be (It is too bad the city took it out, we could use a little shelter these days).

The re-made trail along the eastern rim of lower Red Rock Canyon is well done with beautiful views. The bomb shelter trail takes you there.

There is a great new trail at the south end of the dump that was built by VOC volunteers and a trail machine. It runs east-west and accesses a new meadow and rocks formations that I had never seen before. It makes a wonderful walking/running/biking loop from Section 16 trail-head using part of the White Acres trail and the Intemann trail.

There is a brand new section of the Intemann trail near the Crystal Hills connection. Check it out. It is beautiful and much easier for mountain bikes. By May 20th there will be a brand new trail on the east side. It will start at the White Acres picnic pavilion and go up to the top of the Dakota Hogback to the west. From there you can



use the White Acres trail to go left to Section 16 trail-head or back north to the Hogback trail and the other parking lots.

By now all you adventurous souls have hopefully walked/biked/ran the "East Fork OF The Sand Canyon Trail" (Maybe they can come up with a better name than "EFOTSC" trail). It is a gorgeous trail that takes you through picturesque landscape from Sand Canyon up to the Lori Cohen bench on the Intemann Trail. (If you are a biker, watch out for the turn some call the abyss).

It is spring and there are lots of good people enjoying Red Rock Canyon. Try to stay on the trails to protect the natural habitat all around. Please make sure you and your dog leave no trace for other to see. Thanks.

June 11	Red Rock Canyon	Build New Trail in White Acres and close off a renegade trail.
June 18	Soda Springs Park	Making a flag stone path and improving the pavilion and landscaping at the park.
July 9	Red Rock Canyon	Build New Trail in White Acres and close off a renegade trail.
August 13	Manitou Springs	General trail maintenance, repair and corridor clearing on Intemann Trail and Iron Mountain Trail).
September 10	El Paso County	Ute Indian Trail - General trail maintenance, repair and corridor clearing.

We meet at **8 a.m.** at a pre-determined site where we will sign waivers, assign crews and do the safety talk. We will car pool to the work sight. We work until 1 p.m and then go back to Manitou for a complimentary beer or beverage at a local tavern.

Please register at www.ManitouCats.com if you want to volunteer, so we know how many tools and crew leaders we need. The work is mild to moderately difficult with a 1/3 to 2/3 mile hike to get to most worksites. Workdays are open to people 16 years and up.

...More Flies with Honey

The old adage of attracting more flies with honey than vinegar seems to have a new iteration: you attract more volunteers with cold beverages.

Last year, the Board of Friends of Red Rock Canyon (FORRC) decided to revive an old tradition of meeting once a month to do trail work in the evening during the week. This is in part, an effort to keep in touch with our roots as an organization; people committed to trail building, service, and conservation (specifically at Red Rock Canyon).

With the promise of free cold libations at Fossil Brewery after work, a crew of about 20 volunteers and FORRC board members gathered on October 20, 2016 at the 30th Street Parking Lot of Red Rock Canyon. This was the largest turnout for one of our monthly work parties. I concluded the turnout was due to the promise of cold beverage, hence the adage about attracting more volunteers with cold beverages. Regardless of their motives, it was a great turn-out, and we managed to remove about 100 yards of derelict barb-wire fence, fence post, and other miscellaneous

detritus along 30th Street between the parking lot and Highway 24. (We also probably managed to drink about 5 gallons of beverage afterwards). Thank you to everyone who came out, it was a great time!

We've decided to continue the monthly work parties again this year. These parties are a great way to get involved with the hands-on experience of volunteering at the open space, getting out in nature in the middle of the week, and meeting some great folks as part of the process. I can't make any promises for other party leaders, but any work party that I lead this year will include 1 free beverage at Fossil Brewery afterwards for every volunteer that shows up.

The party times and locations will be advertised in the Red Rock Rag, on the FORRC Facebook page, and on the FORRC website so keep an eye out for information regarding these upcoming events! As always, please clean up and carry out your dog's poop, and I hope to see you out in the Openspace.

Meet the Rangers

You may or may not have seen these guys in our open spaces but they are an invaluable asset to Red Rock Canyon and the other open spaces they manage.

We thought you might like a little background on our hard working Rangers Dan Allen and John Stark.

Dan earned a BS in Biology from St. Lawrence University. Following graduation he worked as an AmeriCorps member mapping invasive plants with the Washington State Department of Natural Resources. He then worked on an AmeriCorps crew that conducted trail work and maintained streamside plantings along tributaries of the Columbia River. Dan moved to Colorado to work as Field Coordinator for the Rocky Mountain Field Institute for two years. With RMFI he coordinated and supervised trail management and wildfire restoration projects. Following work with RMFI, he

worked as a Natural Resource Technician with the Coalition for the Upper South Platte conducting forest health and wildfire restoration projects in the South Platte River watershed. Dan started with the Department in December 2014. He worked as a maintenance technician in Palmer Park for one year and as park ranger in the Garden of the Gods for another year. Dan transitioned over to the TOPS Stewardship program in November 2016 where he serves currently as a park ranger.

John attended the University of Denver where he earned a Master's degree in Natural Resources Law & Policy. John has worked in many different areas of the conservation field including historic preservation, environmental planning and serving as a park ranger for the National Park Service at parks in Alaska, California and New Mexico. John has been working for the City of Colorado Springs for 3 1/2 years and serves now as Park
