'Friends' applies for trail grant

Friends of Red Rock Canyon has applied to the Colorado State Parks Trails Program for a \$15,000 grant to help cover the expenses for a trail building project which will develop nearly a mile of trail.

This trail will link the southern portion of Red Rock Canyon to the Internann Trail connection which was built this past year and to the southern portion of the Sand Canyon Trail. That part of the trail between Red Rock Canyon and the Internann Trail connection will generally follow the route of a historic equestrian trail which was used by the Roundup Stables for Red Rock Canyon ponyrides sixty and seventy years ago. The trail will form part of new, longer, trail loops which can incorporate nearly all of the Red Rock Canyon, Greenlee Canyon, Mesa, and Sand Canyon Trails.

Volunteers for Outdoor Colorado will assume the major responsibility for organizing and carrying out the project Friends of Red Rock Canyon will contribute \$2,50 toward project costs and will assist with project management in cooperation with the City of Colorado Springs and VOC. Colorado Springs' TOPS program will contribute \$7,000 toward the project. We expect volunteer work to contribute more than \$50,000 of "in kind" value to the project.

This trail building project is planned for October 14 & 15, 2006.

Big plans for 2006

Chris Leiber, Manager of Design Development and TOPS, outlined the City's plans for Red Rock Canyon improvements for the coming year at the November third meeting of Friends of Red Rock Canyon.

Improvements to the High Street entrance and main trailhead parking area top the list of city projects. Plans call for doubling the capacity of the main parking lot and constructing a trail along the Highway 24 frontage. Construction of the 31st street trailhead is also planned for 2006. This trailhead will accommodate horse trailer parking. Along with building the 31st Street trailhead, the City plans to build a multi-use trail which will connect the trailhead to Red Rock Canyon and the High Street entrance.

2006 plans also call for preparing architectural and engineering construction drawings for converting the Bock House to the proposed pavilion / shelter.

Volunteer work in 2005 valued at \$99,544.00

The Colorado Springs Department of Parks, Recreation and Cultural Services has placed a value of \$99,544.00 on the work that 1,063 volunteers contributed in building trails, cleaning up, and planting trees in Red Rock Canyon Open Space during the past year.

Trail building efforts this past year have focused on Sand Canyon near the western edge of Red Rock Canyon Open Space and on the mesa just east of Sand Canyon.

The Garden of the Goddesses Club completed the pedestrian only Contemplative Trail which follows the row of Fountain sandstone fins in Sand Canyon. The Sand Canyon Trail runs east of the Contemplative trail and roughly parallels it. The Sand Canyon Trail and two trails connecting it to the Mesa. Trail were completed through work sponsored by REI along with work done by the Colorado Legends and Legacies Youth Corps, which was hired by the Colorado Springs Department of Parks, Recreation and Cultural Services. With the Mesa Trail connected to the Greenlee Canyon and Red Rock Canyon trails by the Quarry Pass Trail

which was built by Volunteers for Outdoor Colorado in the Fall of 2004, the central and western areas of Red Rock Canyon Open Space now have a system of connected trails. Except for southern link between Sand Canyon and Red Rock Canyon, these trails largely complete the planned trail system in the western part of Red Rock Canyon Open Space.

Following the Arbor Day volunteer revegetation work on the mesa areas above the main entrance, both offleash dog loops were constructed and have now been opened. There is now a trail connection from the Upper Dog Loop to the Sand Canyon Trail.

Work on the trail connecting Red Rock Canyon Open Space to the Internann Trail in Section 16 began with an August 14 trail day sponsored by the Internann Trail Committee. Approximately 50 volunteers cleared roughly half of the 2200 foot long trail. The trail was completed on September 24 when REI sponsored a trail work day along with the Friends of Red Rock Canyon and the Internann Trail Committee. Since trails in Section 16 are part of the Ring the Peak Trail, the connection to the Internann Trail links the Red Rock Canyon trail network into the region-wide trail system.
